Exhibition of Interest

Rembrandt's World: Dutch Drawings from the Clement C. Moore Collection.

On now and continuing through April 29, 2012 at the Morgan Library Museum, 225 Madison Ave. New York City. Ninety works on paper, all promised to the Morgan Library, but with only four attributed to Rembrandt.

Although lacking in 'star power' the show presents an all-encompassing look at life during the Golden Age in the Dutch Republic.

Van Gogh Up Close – Philadelphia Museum of Art. Now through May 6, 2012.

The show focuses on Van Gogh's ability to depict nature up close. It is centered almost exclusively on landscapes, with a few still lifes of flowers and fruits. There are no portraits, self-portraits or interiors. Included in the exhibition are 45 paintings. Many are unfamiliar works from abroad, some of which, never before exhibited in this country.

Mauritshuis closing for renovation

You will probably never see Vermeer's painting "The Girl with the Pearl Earring" in the Rijksmuseum in Amsterdam. Beginning in April 2012, you will neither be able to see it in its home in the Mauritshuis in The Hague. The Mauritshuis will close for renovation in April.

However, beginning in January 2013, you will be able to see "The Girl" along with 34 other paintings from the Mauritshuis on tour in the United States. The first stop on the tour of the exhibition *Vermeer, Rembrandt and Hals: Masterpieces of Dutch Paintings from the Mauritshuis* will be the DeYoung Fine Arts Museums of San Francisco from January 26 through June 2, 2013. The exhibition then moves on to the High Museum of Art in Atlanta from June 22 through September 29. It will finally open at the Frick Collection in New York City on October 22, 2013.

However, the exhibition that comes to New York will be much smaller than the shows at the two other museums. It will feature just 10 paintings from the Mauritshuis but the show will be mounted in the beautiful Oval Room near the Frick's three paintings by Vermeer: "Girl Interrupted at Her Music", "Mistress and Maid" and "Officer and Laughing Girl". Besides "The Girl", the Frick's show will also include "The Goldfinch" by Fabritius and portraits by Rembrandt, and Frans Hals, and a landscape by Jacob van Ruisdael.

"What do Flemish and Dutch people living abroad miss most?"

Croquettes #2 with 3 respondents. Tied for #3 with 2 respondents each: family, trains, Vla (a sort of pudding), koeken (a sort of cookie/cake), new herring, French fries, and smoked eel. Finally, with

one respondent each: tulip fields, chocolate, Amsterdam, polders and dikes, shrimp, poffertjes, good Dutch bread, bitterballen, farm life, Dutch gin, shopping, and any sort of food from snack-bars.

For those really missing "Dutch" stuff, or just because you like the food, you can satisfy all your cravings for most "missed" items at VanderVeen's Dutch Store in the Grand Rapids neighborhood. You will find croquettes, koeken, bitterballen, friet sauce, and most everything else Dutch in their store. They have a nice on-line catalog, which makes shopping easier: www.thedutchstore.com. However, you will not find Dutch gin there. The State of Michigan prohibits its sale here.

Food

Salsify

Janet Broos recently discovered the vegetable salsify (scorzonera in Italian, and schorseneren to the Dutchies) which Ton knew from Holland and which Janet now likes very much. So far, Plum Market in Ann Arbor is the only place Janet has been able to find the vegetable and it is only available when in season. Most European cookbooks have recipes for salsify and I am sure the dutchies have their own favorite way of preparing it. BUT - did you know that salsify dates back to the 17th century and comes from Spain. It was known as "viper's weed" because it was used to treat people with snakebite. It came into use in Europe in the 18th century. By the middle of the 19th century, it had become quite popular as a root vegetable. In the late 20th century, it disappeared almost entirely from markets, but now seems to be making a comeback. Janet would appreciate an e-mail from anyone who happens to see it in a market other than Plum's. Also she welcomes your interesting recipes for salsify.

After more than 10 years, New York
Times food critic, Mark Bittman, recently
returned to Amsterdam to find real Dutch food.
He states that he found it after much research
and eating. He goes on to say that nothing in
Amsterdam is Dutch in the same way a
trattoria is Italian in Tuscany but he does say
that in the restaurants he writes about you will

know that you are in the Netherlands. Some of the places he reviewed were Restaurant As, Wilde Zwijnen, Blauw (Indonesian), Lastage (fancy) and Greetje. If you subscribe to the Times on-line, you can check out the article, which appeared on Sunday, January 22, 2012.

THIS AND THAT (mostly trivia)

Some of the comments from Ton's students on the DeVries-VanderKooy Memorial Lecture presented by Professor Ludo Beheydt on October 20, 2011 were quite interesting. Jakarta has the worst air quality in Indonesia. There were only 27 days of clean air per year. Samarang and Bandung do not seem to be much better, with only 30 days of clean air per year. An 11-year-old Dutch girl, together with her parents, reached the top of Mt. Kilimanjaro in Tanzania. Although not the youngest to reach the summit, Yvet Renkema is the youngest Dutch mountaineer to accomplish this feat. Several ten-year olds climbed to the top of the mountain before her.
